Did you get the last question? Absolutely capital! Moving along, I might note that when thinking about what car to use for an exhibit on safety, I would not personally have hit upon a Dodge Neon, but to each his own. In any case, the first passenger-side airbags were installed in minivans in the year:

That was the same year of what natural disaster (which is pictured on the wall of this gallery for roughly 20 seconds out of every minute)?

If you take the first word of the previous answer (again, not counting 'the'), its letters can be rearranged into three words: a color, a type of jewelry, and a type of weather. Those three words are:

Find any of the license plates on this floor that are painted in the color that appears in the previous answer. Besides the state name, what two words do those license plates have on them? The first word from the previous answer is a combination of two words (it is a "compound word," to use the formal term). Take that word and split it apart into its components (5 letters and 4 letters). Flip the order of the words. In front of the 4-letter word, add another 4-letter word that means 'person in charge.' At the end of the 5-letter word, add a 3-letter word that



means 'staff with personnel.' You now have two compound words that form the name of the villain from a very famous American story written nearly two centuries ago. What character was the hero (and the probable victim) of that story?

Horseless -> Less Horse -> Head+Less Horse+Man -> [2]
Headless Horseman, making the answer Ichabod Crane

The character from the previous answer attempts to escape his nemesis in the story, but is apparently unsuccessful (the author is deliberately vague on this point). If you flee over to Ryan's Market, you'll see a display likely to cause a very famous artist to claim plagiarism (or copyright infringement, perhaps, I'm not sure). Actually, that's probably not going to happen, because the artist has been dead for a fairly long time. He is:

Andy Warhol (Campbell's Soup Cans) [2)

That artist's most valuable work (at least to date) was a painting that displayed the image of a legendary American entertainer eight times. The painting sold for exactly \$100 million. The entertainer also died an untimely death, which definitely left the American public all shook up. He was:

Elvis Presley (the \$100 million painting shows him in a (2) cowboy outfit drawing a gun)

The last name from the previous answer can be rearranged to form only one legal scrabble "bingo" (a word that uses up all of a player's 7 letters and earns a bonus of 50 points). The actual definition of the word is "those who utter a short cry or bark, as a dog" but on first glance the word appears to refer to the users of a popular Internet review site. The seven letter-word is:

A Yelpers (1)

The website referenced in the question above includes reviews of universities. The very first review presented for one local university says, "The professors are knowledgeable and some are very committed to your success. We also have a Farm Store that I shop at all time to support the local crops!" What university, located approximately 25 miles west of downtown Los Angeles, is being described by this reviewer? (informal name)



Find the vehicle located on this level that was (probably) manufactured in location named in the previous question, and read its accompanying placard. One word on that placard fits on the following list:

The "presidential" Pep Boy's middle name is also the last name of a baseball player who played just one game in the major leagues





In the movie, this one-game wonder was portrayed by a legendary actor—an Academy Award winner known primarily for "tough guy" roles. It proved to be this actor's final film appearance;



he retired from the movie business in 1989 and passed away in 1994. That actor is:



- If you got the last question right, you are undoubtedly shocked by the answer. And speaking of electricity: Who was president of the United States when inventor Robert Anderson (apparently) developed the first electric automobile?
- The placard by the Ford Focus EV reveals the year to be 1832, which makes the answer Andrew Jackson
- Continuing with this series of highly charged questions, in 1971 a new musical debuted in Chicago. At that time, the two-word title of both the musical and its main theme included the answer to Question 17. When the play moved to Broadway in 1972, its title was reduced to one word, though the title of the theme stayed the same. What was the name of the musical?
- "Grease," whose theme and original title are

- 20 Now find the vehicle that would not be in this museum if it was not for the musical from the last question. On the accompanying placard the names of five different people are given. Which of their surnames could be added to this list?

- Travolta (surnames of people who have played Bill Clinton. (1)
 Bill appeared as himself in "The Last Party"
- As noted, the musical from the previous two questions debuted in 1971. One year earlier, a noted musician died of an overdose only four miles away from where you are standing right now. 

Part V: Lists

These items may be anywhere in the game area. Please do not use an answer more than once within this section.

Find 10 vehicles that have a number printed or engraved on their chassis (excluding license plates; no photos of vehicles or models for this question).

I had originally intended to provide an answer key for this section, like the others, but then decided it was more instructive to just provide a few remarks for each question. For this one, I will note that there are about 20 vehicles that suit the needs of the question, but one definitely has to move beyond race cars where the number is highlighted and has to look for less pronounced numbers. The AAA truck, for example, has the number 1900 on it ("serving America since 1900"), the Packard Super 8 has its model number on it, and so forth.

Find 5 different colors of California license plates and plates from 5 other states (Note: In the 1930s, plates only had abbreviations, like 'AL' or 'ILL').

There are multiple specimens of blue, white, red, yellow, and black California plates scattered around the museum. the other states are harder; I only found five other states represented on the vehicles in the museum, namely Illinois, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Colorado, and Alabama. The Alabama one is particularly hard to find, and requires careful reading of the instructions I wrote above.

If you could not find all five of the states I list above, there were two other ways to finish the list that I could think of. The first would be to go out into the parking lot, which is legal (as noted in the instructions), and would likely have at least a few Arizonas or Nevadas or Washingtons. The other is to go to the gift shop; the car books there are full of examples. In fact, just looking at the covers of the car books gives you Maryland (the Camaro book) and Idaho (the Ford Deuce book).

Find words in 5 different foreign languages (proper names are acceptable) and the names of 5 different restaurants

Several languages are pretty easy to locate, and can be satisfied with basic words from the language's vocabulary. Spanish is easiest (Los Angeles, for example, or Tamale). French isn't far behind (Grand Prix, for example, or Le Mans, or Rochet). Now, I know "Los Angeles" is a proper name, but it's made up of two words that are not. German can be done without resorting to proper nouns if you find the 1946 Kaiser. It's easier to do with the proper names, however, as the word Duesenberg is all over the gallery. For most other languages, it is necessary to resort to proper names. Armenian can be listed with the use of the name Iskenderian (located in the "Speed Shop"), Italian can be done with any of the cars in the Italian gallery.

In terms of restaurants, I noted six. Johnny Rocket's (lobby), Jamm's (first floor exhibit on drive-ins), Bob's Big Boy (first floor exhibit on drag racing), Dog Cafe (Dog Cafe exhibit), The Brown Derby (Dog Cafe exhibit), and Mel's Drive-In ("American Graffiti" poster). There are also some mentioned in the books in the gift shop, and also in the painting in the lobby.

Find 10 different vehicles that named for the company's founder(s) and/or the car's creator (for example, '2006 Toyota Prius' would count if that company had been founded by a man named John Toyota, or a man named Toyota Johnson). Must be 10 different companies/creators.

There were quite a lot of options here; I'd guess this was probably the easiest list to finish. Among them were the vehicles made by Ford, Studebaker, Deusenberg, DeLorean, Willys-Knight, White, Miller, Kurtis, Darrin, Packard, Gurney, Chrysler, and Ferrari

Find vehicles produced during each of these Republican presidencies (no photos of vehicles or models for this question):

Each president was represented by at least two vehicles, except for Thesodore Roosevelt and William McKinley. I had to omit one Republican president entirely, William Howard Taft, as I could not find a specimen for his years (1909-1913). The easiest presidency to find, interestingly, was Dwight D. Eisenhower. I suppose this makes sense, given that the 1950s are a beloved era in car production and design.
